LIGHTHOUSES - THE FLANNAN ISLES

LEARNING ACTIVITIES SUCCESS CRITERIA

I can research the history of the lighthouses around Scotland and the Stevenson family, and make a display/map/poster/ webpage about the Flannan Isles lighthouse.

Find out about:

- how many of the Stevenson family were involved in lighthouse building.
- over what period did they build lighthouses.
- where the Flannan Isles are.
- which Stevenson built the Flannan Isles lighthouse.
- when it was built.
- the shore station at Breasclete on the Isle of Lewis.
- how the light keepers contacted the outside world before radio communication.
- how long the Flannan Isles remained manned.
- how the lighthouse is operated nowadays.

I can write a newspaper report on the disappearance of three men from the Flannan Isles lighthouse in 1900:

- read the official Northern Lighthouse Board reports from 1900 about what happened on Flannan Isles.
- read other reports giving accounts and theories about the disappearance of the three men.
- try to distinguish facts about the mystery from opinions and theories
- write your own newspaper report including:
 - » headline
 - a subheading (a sentence summarising the
 - introductory paragraph (who, what, when, where, why)
 - main story (where you tell the reader more details)
 - » picture with caption (try and get a picture from the internet)

I can study Wilfrid Wilson Gibson's poem 'Flannan Isle' and give a personal response to it:

- identify words and phrases used in the first five verses to make Eilean Mòr seem like an eerie and sinister place.
- Highlight three or more lines in verse eight which show how the poet builds up the tension when the men enter the lighthouse.
- does the poet keep the tense atmosphere going in the last two verses and is this effective.
- write a 100 word summary giving your own opinion of the poem.

QUESTIONS TO CHECK HIGHER ORDER THINKING SKILLS

Why were lighthouses needed round the Scottish coastline?

Why do you think the same family over generations were involved in lighthouse building?

What were the main challenges they faced in building lighthouses in remote locations?

Would you like to be a lighthouse keeper? Why/why not?

What do you think happened on the Flannan Isles when the men disappeared?

How is a newspaper report different from other reports?

Do you think the poet WW Gibson was right in using 'poetic license' to make his poem more dramatic?

What do you think of the poem?
